## Dragonflies and Damselflies: Identification and Ecology

August 2-3 (Saturday & Sunday)

Instructor: Robert DuBois is an aquatic ecologist with the DNR. In addition to research on aquatic ecosystems, he leads citizen monitoring efforts for dragonflies and damselflies and has recently published Damselflies of the North Woods and Dragonflies and Damselflies of the Rocky Mountains.

The Course: After an introduction to dragonfly and damselfly biology and the morphology/ terminology used in the keys, the group will learn collection and/or observation techniques in the field. In the evening we will focus on keying with the goal of learning the families and genera represented in Wisconsin. On Saturday, the group will continue its field and laboratory work.

Available for 1.4 CEU. Not offered for college credit

#### A Very High Quality of Instruction

Our workshops offer a unique opportunity to explore focused topics in natural history under the guidance of noted authorities. Hands-on field and laboratory investigations teach ecology, evolution, use of taxonomic keys, and techniques. The workshops present college-level instruction and are designed to accommodate participants with a broad range of experience. The only prerequisite for any of the workshops is a keen interest in the topic. Enrollment in each session is limited to 20, providing an informal atmosphere and individualized instruction.

This class can be taken for continuing education credits. You can request a certificate that documents your completion of the course. There is no additional charge for continuing education credits. The class carries 1.4 CEU credits.

#### **Additional Information**

The workshop fee includes overnight accommodations (bring your own sleeping bag and towels). Four excellent meals (2 lunches, Saturday dinner, Sunday breakfast) are provided at cost and are optional. All meals include plenty to satisfy vegetarians. Please order the meal plan at the time your registration is submitted.

#### DIRECTIONS TO THE UWM FIELD STATION

#### FROM MILWAUKEE:

Take I-43 North to Hwy 33 (Saukville Exit, 22 miles north of downtown Milwaukee). Hwy 33 West to Blue Goose Road (Blue Goose is 4.3 miles west of Saukville and 2.7 miles west of the intersection of Hwy 33 and Co Hwy I). Take Blue Goose Road South 1.9 miles to the Field Station (second driveway on the west side of Blue Goose, south of Knollwood Road).

#### FROM MADISON:

Take Hwy 151 NE to Hwy 60 East. Hwy 60 East to Co Hwy Y (you will reach Y when you are in Ozaukee County and approaching the Cedarburg/Grafton area). Co Hwy Y North to St. Augustine Road (St. Augustine is about 4 miles north of Hwy 60). St. Augustine Road East for 1 mile, then the road turns north and becomes Blue Goose Road. The Field Station is on your left after the road turns north.


